Reports:

- 1. Doug reported on the Scene From the Air exhibition.
- 2. Bus tour: Tim reported that the trip was inspirational for the visitors and perhaps a morale boost to property owners wearied by the drought TFN and other properties were visited.
- 3. Connecting Country Information Session Launch: This will be on Saturday April 12 from 10 am to 1 pm. The subcommittee will arrange details. They will meet on Tuesday at 10.30
- 4. Name and Logo: satisfaction was expressed at the name Connecting Country. A 'draft' orchid logo was viewed. A mountain may be added.
- 5. Nicole reported on Greening Australia's River Recovery project, which involves the Yarra and the Coliban.
- 6. Julie presented a powerpoint summary report on the work so far: an overview of existing plans, players and programs, and next steps.

Responses to the report raised various questions:

- on the different meanings of sustainability [for example, to farmers and public land managers];
- on the matter of marginal agricultural land;
- on incentives to landowners to value sustainability.

Suggestions included the following:

- case studies as incentive models;
- relating the project to the upcoming Green Paper;
- clarifying the relevance of World Heritage proposals [Doug, David and Bernard will produce a report on this];
- the implications of changing weather patterns: how will species react to change? What corridors will they need to use? [Tim and Christine will look at this theme]
- the importance of ongoing research [this may form part of a possible stage 2 in the project]
- the importance of knowledge gained on the ground by people with local knowledge and commitment: people should be asked what they want, not informed from a distance.
- the relevance of urban areas to the biodiversity question.
- 7 Julie raised the matter of the website, and its use as a means of getting input.

Lively discussions on issues took place throughout the meeting and members felt that communication was good.
